Silver Spring Station: Jeff Peck

On December 5th, we made a trip to Silver Spring to set up at the Historic B & O station as part of the celebration of the station's 75th anniversary. The celebration is significant as the ever-changing landscape of Silver Spring redevelopment has swung its guns at the station. Even though the building is on the National Register of Historic Places, the grounds are not and the station is looking at losing a majority of its outdoor space to Metropolitan Branch Trail expansion and the construction of a 6 story building in the rear of the adjoining firehouse. It's looking like they're headed to court to either alter the plans or be compensated for their losses.



Later in the day our hosts had a short celebration documenting the history of the station for the last 75 years and further back to the station it replaced that was built in the 1870's capped off by an excellent cake. Shortly after, we broke down the layout and headed off in to the sunset.




We arrived to find CSX trains literally running bumper to bumper because of a balky lift bridge over the Anacostia River.
