
Raffle layout 2018: Al Potter

F-250SD's Train Ride to Maryland: Ryan Jones

My company has been working towards compliance of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's mandate for electronic logging devices for commercial motor carriers. The objective of the rule, according to FMCSA, is to strengthen commercial truck and bus drivers' compliance of the hours-of-service (HOS) regulations that combat fatigue. The mandate requires both a human interface device (a tablet) and a data transmitting device that gets plugged into the vehicle's OEM data port. This hardware is referred to as Telematics.

Telematics combines engine data, accelerometer data, and GPS data to provide trucking companies with a comprehensive package of information, from truck engine information to truck whereabouts, history of routes traveled and speed. A web service is being used to streamline all this information into actionable events such as the engine running and the truck not moving will show idling duration, and driving around a corner too fast or stopping too fast will activate the accelerometer showing how many G forces were pulled.

All new vehicle leases for my company come with the transmitter already installed. One day, I was checking up on our fleet and noticed one within a few miles of my home. I zoomed in on the map and discovered it was sitting in the CSX Auto Distribution yard in Jessup Maryland.

Thanks to Telematics, I was able to follow the truck's ten-day journey from the Ford Plant in Kentucky to Jessup, Maryland. Here is a short story of that journey as told from the point of view of our new truck.





I was built at Ford Motor Company's Kentucky Truck Plant by some hard-working American auto workers. On Tuesday December 12th, somebody drove me inside this metal box that looked unlike any truck chassis I had ever seen before.

Unlike me, this box didn't have tires and was rolling around on metal beams that

That's when I noticed my shocks and struts were bouncing. Wait and second, those trucks outside aren't moving....I am? But my engine isn't running! What is happening to me?





December 14th, was hard on my shocks. It felt like my friends and I were going back and forth, back and forth. This went on for two days. The


