Free-moN: John Hale

Hello, fellow Bantrakers!

As promised this is a quick walk through of how we can build new Free-moN modules. There is a lot less torque placed on Free-moN modules when setting up for a show because we are not trying to close a loop. This allows us to use lightweight, but strong construction methods.

First, we start with high quality 7 ply Baltic birch plywood (¾ inch thick). We rip the sheet into manageable 6 inch tall pieces. Cut them to the width of the module (our Bantrak Recommended Practice (RP) is 18" wide). Add some side rails (with holes cut for UP5/UP7 panels). Add a top made of foam, add legs (legs must be painted black before a show). Add the roadbed including the first 3 inches from each end of the module being birch wood (not cork). Add track and paint.

We hope the photos show just how easy this process is. If you do not have the tools, or needed skills to get to this point, contact us and we can get you the needed help.

John Hale and Eric Payne are your primary points of contact for how Bantrak is implementing the Free-moN standard to both meet our modeling needs and still conform to national standards to improve interoperability with other Free-moN clubs. Beware of Scammers on Facebook: Freddie Mitchell

Ever since buying and selling on the internet became a normal, scams have been around to trick unsuspecting consumers out of their hard-earned money. Scammers have evolved through the times to answer the demands of the online market. Consumers are warned about using PayPal without pressing the Goods and Services (G&S) option when buying items online. Now Facebook has updated itself to handle transactions between consumers and sellers in the marketplace. This created a new kind of scam that I myself fell into and hopefully you can learn from my mistakes.

Since Rapido produced their N scale Comet coaches for Metro North, I have been on the hunt for the matching FL9s that were produced in 2016. These locomotives are sought after and don't stay on eBay for very long. Instead of waiting for someone to post one on eBay, I decided to post a "In search of" (ISO) post in a n scale buy and sell group. The post was short and to the point:

"ISO Rapido N Scale Metro North FL9"
At first, I got a couple of likes, but no responses. But then I woke up to prepare for work when I saw that someone responded to my post. The person was named Donald Jennings and he posted pictures of a FL9 I was looking for. He responded below the post to reach out to him if I was interested. I immediately sent him a private message (PM) The conversation went like this:

"Hey Donald, you have a FL9 for sale?"

"Yes, I do. It is the one pictured. Asking \$120 for it. We can go through PayPal if that's ok with you. Only used these at a small club at my church."


"Works for me,"

"Great, I'll send you a money request through Facebook,"

"I thought we are going to go through PayPal."

"We are, but if we do it through Facebook, you are still protected by PayPal's buyer protection and paying a lower fee,"

Then he sent this screenshot:



"Ok, I guess that works for me. I usually just send it though PayPal. Send the invoice."

"Sounds good, here is the first request, for some reason, it will not allow me to ask for the full amount because we are not friends."

He sent about three payment requests that totaled up to the original agreed upon price of \$120. I paid all of them. He then told me that he had another one and asked for \$80 for the other. Here were the photos he sent:

I asked if they were N-scale and he responded yes. Last thing he told me was he would have these locomotives shipped off at the end of the week An hour after this happened, his profile, posts, and PMs disappeared. Additionally, I found out after I sent all the money that Donald stole these photos off of an HO eBay posting and cropped out some of the information. Additionally, I found out the Facebook payment requests he sent were "Friends and Family" transactions. When they are performed on Facebook, I couldn't see the designation.

I asked the admins of the Facebook group if they ever dealt with Donald, to which they replied "He's not part of this group." I had to send them screenshots to prove that he was in fact part of the N-scale group. I reported this incident to PayPal, Facebook, and my bank in hopes that they will act on this. But because this was a Friends and Family transaction, there is a very high chance of nothing will happen.

From this experience, I have learned a lot. Here are some checks I should have done:


- 1. Ask for a picture of the locomotive with his name and date in the photo
- 2. Request to send the payment through PayPal Goods and Services and nothing else so that you are protected
- 3. Look for previous posts from the seller
- 4. Ask the Facebook group in general for any experiences they have had with the member
- 5. Search eBay to see if the seller is using pictures from another posts
- 6. Always use caution and don't rush!

I guess it is back on the hunt. Stay safe and hopefully this article helps!
