



### Free-MoN build: Jeff Kehrer

For full disclosure, this is my first Free-Mo module. I have finished two layouts and I'm currently working on my third layout and I'm finding that my favorite part is working on the scenery. When Eric gave me the blank slate, it sat for a while until I was ready to dive in. The only thing I knew I wanted on it was a diamond crossing. Don't know why but I've been fascinated with these on railroad lines for as long as I can remember.

After the track work and wiring was completed, it was tested over and over again until I was satisfied that I was good to go for scenery. The good thing about R. Jeremy Crossing is that it's divided into 4 quadrants so that made it nice to work on. Finish one and then move on.

The first section I worked on was the only industry that is on the scene. Wasn't sure of the name so I just went with Tradepoint Atlantic Industries for the name. Being a volunteer at the B&O Museum in Rail Operations, we do business with Tradepoint from time to time. I used a technique that has worked great for me before on my past layouts placing objects that you may see right up against a building as a guide for perfect building placement every time. In this case I lined one side with some ties and had a stack of ties on the other. Everything else in that section is glued down.



Across the tracks is a small country church very much like my Mom and Dad's church in Western New York in the very small town of Aloquin. The front sidewalk is permanently glued so the church placement during setup is easy placing it right against the



sidewalk. Although my folks' church does not have a cemetery on its property, a friend of mine kept bugging me that this church needed a cemetery. The one small side note on the cemetery is when my paternal grandfather was alive, I always remembered as a kid that when he saw a grave that had a pile of flowers on it (ceremony completed), he would always nudge me and say, "look over there, there's a fresh one."



Across the road and crossing tracks is where the Control Tower was placed along with a Western Maryland office building.

The hardest part of this (in my opinion) was transportation of this for shows. I could make a box or something along that line so I thought why not utilize the underside and see if storage is possible. As you can see that with a couple screws, plastic container, a small box and some rubber bands, I can hide the scenery for storage and transportation.
