The next club meeting is August 18th, 2pm at Chris Quinlan's house, 500 East Maple Road, Linthicum Heights, MD 21090.



My Model Train Story: Chris Quilan

I was always destined to love trains. Before I knew what a train was, I was obsessed with construction and farm equipment. The backhoe was my favorite tractor. As a toddler, I lived in Albuquerque, New Mexico. A neighborhood was being built adjacent to my boyhood home. My parents would take me over to the construction site to see the progress on the homes, but I was most interested in all the heavy machinery! It was like a gateway drug!

I remember seeing a commercial for an HO-scale Tyco G.I. Joe Trainset before Christmas around 1985 and decided I wanted one from Santa. However, the seed was planted!
