### Halloween Layout Lauren Baker

This year's Halloween layout went up in an organized manner. I have learned over the years, with the help of friends, little tricks to make it easier. I moved the tent west in the driveway which gave better access to the tent and layout (the driveway is wider there). It also seemed to help with the wind gusts when erecting the tent as the house and house next door added a bit of buffer. The real help however, was the 50-pound bags of play sand left



over from the pool liner replacement. They just fit into the homer buckets and were perfect corner anchors. I kept the tent low to hang all the lights, including the 4 black lights. I used Velcro ties attached on one side to the light strings and wrapped them around the tent frame. This allows a little easier removal later instead of a wraparound of the wire and frame together, it also makes setup next year easier. Once I got the lights installed, I brought in the tables and leveled them up as best I could. The driveway slopes steeply in 2 directions here, which is why in the past I have setup in the more level narrower part of the driveway. It took concrete pavers, 2x4's, pallet wood and assorted shims but turned out pretty level. I forgot to place the wall panels around the outside of the tent legs before

I raised everything up to the final height which led to a bit of confusion when it was time for the walls.



Then I raised the tent to full height made sure the legs were plumb and adjusted the ropes to the homer buckets. It was windy, but the anchors held and i was able to get the two north legs off the driveway into the grass where I drove a large tent peg into their feet. I also added 2 guy ropes off the 2 north corners and anchored them into the ground. These arrangements worked very well even with the recent wind gusts so the arrangement should work well next year. I got the sidewalls on and called it a day.

Next day I got the frame together and added the first deck and then all the rides and structures wired with LEDs. I fished the wiring through the previously labeled holes and wired up the lighting control panel and motor for the ghost train ride. Then added the rest of the decks but forgot to fish the wiring for the track switches. I was able to remove just that deck panel, lay out the switches and fish the wiring through. Next, I laid track, added the buildings and figures and little details. Last year I painted the small holes for the street lighting (glow in the dark skulls

attached to black toothpicks) with glow paint. This worked great under the black lights to find these small holes. The layout ran well except for the switch into the yard which was working intermittently for power





I tried feeding track power from another outdoor receptacle but that didn't solve the problem, the black lights are a heftier wattage with two small cooling fans each. I believe it was a temperature-related issue with track power not getting around to the other side of the switch when it was cold, but seemed to restore with warmer temps. Especially on Friday, the warm day, when I went out to troubleshoot the switch and it worked flawlessly. The track did get dirty over-








night as well.




Next few days will be spent tearing down, packing up and storing for next year.
